At the name of Jesus, every knee shall bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. *Philippians 2.10–11*

THE COLLECT FOR PALM SUNDAY:

God of all, you gave your only-begotten Son to take the form of a servant, and to be obedient even to death on a cross: give us the same mind that was in Christ Jesus that, sharing in his humility, we may come to be with him in his glory, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

PALM SUNDAY GOSPEL MARK 11:1-11

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them,

'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately."' They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, 'Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

Notes on Mark 11:1-11.

What an entrance! If Jesus wanted to draw attention and make a statement then this was certainly a dramatic way to do that! The symbolism would have been obvious in many ways. The people would have seen echoes of David in Jesus' entry. On the opposite side of Jerusalem, at the same time, Herod was entering, surrounded by the Roman soldiers, on horseback, greeted by (usually) sullen and silent crowds. The words of praise and blessing for Jesus from the crowds drew even more attention. Immediately opposite the path down from the Mount of Olives was the gate of the temple through which it was believed that the Messiah would enter (though it is not clear whether Jesus entered there). Jesus looked around ... then left and went back the same way. This was not the day for the final step. But the journey had taken a dramatic new step.

Questions to take into Holy Week:

- 1. If someone came to you and asked your assistance 'because God needs your help', what would you answer? Why?
- 2. Have you ever been so excited to see someone that you have done something dramatic? That might have been at a concert. It might have been at an airport. It might have been in private or in public. How do you show your joy?
- 3. Have you ever begun something then realised the time was not quite right, yet? The time would (or will) come. How do you hold a vision of something important until the 'right time'?

READING AT 9.00AM ONLY. MARK 14:3-9

³While Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper, as he sat at the table, a woman came with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment of nard, and she broke open the jar and poured the ointment on his head. ⁴But some were there who said to one another in anger, 'Why was the ointment wasted in this way? ⁵For this ointment could have been sold for more than three hundred denarii, and the money given to the poor.' And they scolded her. ⁶But Jesus said, 'Let her alone; why do you trouble her? She has performed a good service for me. ⁷For you always have the poor with you, and you can show kindness to them whenever you wish; but you will not always have me. ⁸She has done what she could; she has anointed my body beforehand for its burial. ⁹Truly I tell you, wherever the good news is proclaimed in the whole world, what she has done will be told in remembrance of her.'

Notes on Mark 14:3-9.

What that woman, unnamed, offered, was an act of love, a gift given in response to all the blessings she had received. We tell her story still, as Jesus said we would. This week is punctuated with love and confrontation, misunderstanding and hope ... all woven together!

Questions to take into Holy Week:

- 1. Have you ever given a gift worth almost a year's wages? Would you? Under what circumstances?
- 2. Have you ever been offended or disturbed by the way what someone else has shown their love, judging them for some perceived extravagant excess? Why?
- 3. How would you like to be remembered? For which of the 'acts' of your life would you hope that people will hold your memory?

FIRST READING: PHILIPPIANS 2:5-11.

⁵ Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, [though he was] being in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited, ⁷ but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness. And being found in human form, ⁸ he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death - even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Notes on Philippians 2:5-11.

It is widely suggested that this passage was an early hymn, sung during some of the earliest Christian gatherings for worship. The alteration in verse 6 is important. The Greek can be interpreted either to mean the words in the square brackets OR the word in italics. The italicised alternative emphasises that humility and self-giving IS in the very nature of God.

Questions to take into Holy Week:

1. When you pray, have you ever asked to think as God thinks, to see as God sees, to act as God acts? What effect might that approach have on your prayer and on your living?

- 2. How comfortable are you adopting humility, living with a focus on others, serving? How does that show?
- 3. When your 'tongue' is loosened and you tell others about Jesus, what do you say? How is his humility and self-giving a part of the invitation you share?

Psalm 31:9-18 (7.30am only) ANN WINFIELD

⁹ Have mercy upon me, O Lord, for I am in trouble:

my eye wastes away for grief, my throat also and my inward parts.

¹⁰ For my life wears out in sorrow, and my years with sighing: my strength fails me in my affliction, and my bones are consumed.

¹¹ I am become the scorn of all my enemies: and my neighbours wag their heads in derision.

¹² I am a thing of horror to my friends: and those that see me in the street shrink from me.

¹³ I am forgotten like one dead and out of mind:

I have become like a broken vessel.

¹⁴ For I hear the whispering of many: and fear is on every side;

Notes on Psalm 31:9-18

This psalm, as we read it today, looks into the week ahead. It prefigures the experience of Jesus, yet that is not why it was originally written. It was a psalm about the response which often comes when we are faithful to God, and we are criticised and ridiculed. It happens still.

Questions to take into Holy Week:

- 1. Have you ever felt that abandoned? What sustained you?
- 2. Have you ever felt backlash from family, friends, colleagues or others because you have maintained your integrity? How did you respond?
- 3. How do you express in your life that your trust is in God?

GOSPEL: MARK 14:12-16 Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

¹²On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb is sacrificed, his disciples said to him, 'Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?' ¹³So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the city, and a man carrying a jar of water will meet you; follow him, ¹⁴and wherever he enters, say to the owner of the house, "The Teacher asks, Where is my guest room where I may eat the Passover with my disciples?" ¹⁵He will show you a large room upstairs, furnished and ready. Make preparations for us there.' ¹⁶So the disciples set out and went to the city, and found everything as he had told them; and they prepared the Passover meal.

Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Notes on Mark 14:12-16.

Just as Jesus instructed disciples to prepare 'transport' (the donkey), here Jesus instructs his followers to prepare for the next step on the journey, the meal at which the immediate and long term future would be laid bare, where ways of connecting would be initiated which we use still.

Questions to take into Holy Week:

- 1. When we gather to celebrate the Eucharist, when we share Holy Communion, have you ever pondered in awe that we are sharing a meal in a particular way which draws meaning both from events 2000 years ago AND from 3500 years ago? How might that shape your preparations for being here in community sharing that meal?
- 2. What would you say about the Holy Communion to someone wanting to explore worshipping with us?
- 3. How important is it to prepare. Spontaneity can be refreshing, but rich experiences require preparation. How do you contribute to the preparations for our shared times of worship?


